Risdon dam is a water storage facility owned by the State water authority, Tas Water, and we believe that it is the only water storage facility in Australia that allows Radio Yachting. Tas Water has strict guidelines for us which we are happy to abide by.

We sail three classes regularly - One Metre, Marblehead and DF95 - every Wednesday and Sunday with DF95s sailing at Montrose Bay on Thursdays.

Recently, the club formed an affiliation with Montrose Bay Yacht club on the Western shore of the Derwent. This relationship gives us more promotional access to the public and club house facilities. We believe that public interest is increasing and the National Championships will generate even more exposure and momentum into the future.

General Notes

Regatta Ambassadors: Peter Sylvester (0427 610 255) and Chris Wood (0419 317 897) have kindly volunteered to be on hand to solve any problems or provide advice to competitors regarding the venue or Hobart/Tasmania in general.

Skincare: While Tasmania has a mild climate, the UV index is extremely high. Make sure you are well protected. The regatta will have some sunscreen kindly supplied by Ego Pharmaceuticals.

Getting to Montrose Yacht Club: The yacht club is located on the foreshore of Montrose Bay. Access is from the Brooker Highway which is a busy road with fast moving (80 kph) traffic. People arriving from the city, travelling North, should avoid turning right across the highway and instead proceed a further 500 metres to the MONA turnoff which passes under the highway and, turning back towards Montrose, allows drivers to safely turn into the yacht club foreshore on the left.

Car Parking: The main car park will be sufficient for A Class, 10 Rater and Marblehead events. It is intended to restrict car park entry to regatta competitors and officials who need to have access to a vehicle. Public car parking is available nearby. IOM parking will be advised during the event.

Lunches and refreshments: Lunch orders can be made before 10.00 am at the beginning of the day, and will be delivered prior to lunch for collection from the canteen. The canteen will sell a range of snacks and drinks to competitors and members of the public.

Welcome night BBQ: An informal BBQ will be provided free for competitors and volunteers after the last race on the first day of each class. Beer, wine and soft drink will be available for purchase from the club room bar. Competitor's guests are welcome to attend at a cost of \$15 per head.

Presentation Night Dinner: Details of the presentation night dinner will be posted to the regatta notice board during the event.

Salt Water Venue: The River Derwent at Montrose is salt water, however, competitors will be able to rinse off yachts on club house lawns throughout the event. Fortunately, Seamaster (one of our sponsors) distributes Corrosion X - a product widely used to protect electronic components!

Overnight Storage: Sufficient overnight storage will be available for competitors to leave their yachts fully rigged in the secure club function room. The room is secure with locks and alarms, but your yacht is stored at your own risk. Competitors will be responsible for storing their yachts at the end of the day, and removing yachts before 10.00 am each morning. The function room may be in use on evenings when BBQ are scheduled if the weather is poor.

Battery Charging: Not available at the Montrose Club rooms.

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Sailing the Derwent

The Derwent River begins its 240 kilometre journey high up in Tasmania's famed World Heritage Area at Lake St Clair, providing an environmental and agricultural lifeline through the Derwent Valley and Hobart to the Southern Ocean.

Before exploration by the British and French in the 1790's, Aboriginal Tasmanians lived around the Derwent Estuary for at least 6,000 years. There were two language groups – the Mouheneenaa on the western shore, and the Moumairrmenair on the eastern.

European discovery was made during the second (1793) visit of Bruny d'Entre-casteaux. His name 'Rivière du Nord' was never accepted and the English sailor Lieutenant John Hayes named the river 'Derwent' when he came upon the river in April 1793. Unaware of d'Entrecasteaux's visit two months earlier, he named the river after the Derwent in Cumbria, England. Derwent is Celtic for clear water.



Matthew Flinders and George Bass sailed the sloop *Norfolk* upriver in 1798, leading to the first European settlement being located at Risdon Cove, on the opposite shore to Montrose and close to the (man made) Risdon Brook Dam which is home to the Risdon Brook Radio Yacht Club.

David Collins moved the settlement to Sullivans Cove on the western shore, establishing Hobart Town in 1804, and leaving most of the Risdon estuary as natural bushland which has now been handed back to the original owners, Tasmanian Aboriginals.

Risdon Brook Park is owned by TasWater and contains the dam and its catchment. TasWater encourage public use of the park with BBQ facilities, walking and cycling tracks, fishing balconies for people with disabilities, and of course, radio yachting. School and sporting groups use the facilities for cross country running and orienteering.

Sailing on the Derwent has always been an important part of Hobart's history. In fact, the Royal Hobart Regatta (which will be on during the National Championships) is the oldest sporting event in the State, commencing in 1838. While popularity of the regatta is waning, in the past Tasmanians flocked to the Hobart event, as well as other sailing events around the State.

Montrose Bay was named after Montrose House, built on a substantial Estate granted to a free settler painter and botanist, Robert Littlejohn, and dates from 1813. The house still stands but the estate has been progressively subdivided.

Montrose Bay Yacht Club was formed in 1951 with informal sailing in Elwick Bay and by 1953 had grown to fifty members. Clubrooms were constructed in 1956 and sailing continued at that location until 1969 when forced to relocate due to the construction of the new Brooker Highway.

The current MBYC Clubrooms were opened in 1970 and over the following years it has hosted in excess of ten national championships and produced many successful National and International competitors.

The club reached its peak in the 1970's with 95 registered yachts comprising mirrors, NS14's, moths and sabots and while maintaining an active program has found it hard to grow memberships in competition with the large clubs on the Derwent River.

The partnership with Risdon Brook Radio Yacht Club has increased sailing activity in Montrose Bay and it is hoped that, by working together, improved infrastructure can be provided to further enhance the opportunities for all sections of our community to be involved in sailing.

Coinciding with this, nearby MONA (Museum of Old and New Art) has quickly established a solid reputation as a world class art gallery and venue for fine wine, good food and entertainment. MONA was established by a local lad (David Walsh) who made his fortune as a gambler and has now become a Tasmanian legend. A visit to MONA is a must, if possible on the MONA ROMA — a camouflaged ferry that you will see pass by the National Championships as you compete. Montrose Bay is also home to GASP (the Glenorchy Art and Sculpture Precinct) which can be enjoyed via a two kilometre walk along the riverside from the yacht club.

Today over 220,000 people – 43% of Tasmania's population – live around the Derwent estuary. Trout fishing is very popular in its upper reaches and associated lakes, and in Hobart sailing and boating dominates recreational activity on the river. There is plenty more to do and see in Tasmania along the shores of the Derwent and surrounds – just ask any of the RBRYC club members!

Notice of Race - Key points: The attention of competitors is drawn to Clause 15 in the Notice of Race. The venue is a public community park that is popular with local families and there will potentially be a high degree of public interest in the yachting championships.

In these circumstances, good manners and a high degree of sportsmanship is essential. The PRO will be vigilant in ensuring this clause is upheld.

Competitors should also note Clause 16. Montrose Bay has some uneven surfaces which skippers will traverse while competing. Please be careful with your footing, particularly in the early stages of competition.

Also, some sections of the shore are very muddy and all skippers should avoid entering marked areas on the map. Please ask club organisers if you are unsure of dangerous sections.

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
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COMPETITOR PRACTICE AREA: It is intended that Course A can be used for practice when Course C is the competition area. Yachts must not sail further East than the jetty steps. If Course A is the competition area, Course C may be used for practice and no yachts to sail West of foreshore launch steps.

COMPETITOR CAR PARKING: The parking area immediately adjacent to the club house lawns is reserved for competitors. Visitors are welcome to use the Southern car park within the foreshore park.
